

We will let you know of course when this happens and at this point you will be given the opportunity to share your views about the school on the Ofsted Parent View website. We appreciate anyone taking the time to share positive comments and thoughts on the school in support of our efforts to retain a good judgement so that the school can get on with our job of continuing to grow and make progress as we have done in the last 6 years.

If you have any concerns about your child, you can of course talk to their teacher at any time – we are always keen to know about anything that is worrying you or on your mind so please do not save this up, get in touch at any point.

Mobile phones in school

Just a reminder that mobile phones and devices are not allowed in school. In line with recent updated government guidance, our approach to mobile phones has now been added to our behaviour policy which can be found on the school website here. You will see that this includes allowing Oak class children to bring a mobile phone to school if they need it for walking to and from school safely. If your child is going to do this, please make sure you let the school office know by email so that we have written permission for them to bring it in to school. It will be kept safe by Miss Middleton during the day and handed back to your child just before they leave each day. If your child is in Oak class, they can of course walk home on their own, but again you must give us written permission for this via email.

Speak Out, Stay Safe

Before half term, we planned an assembly to talk to the children in Elm, Maple and Oak about the NSPCC 'Speak Out, Stay Safe' initiative. Following this, volunteers from the NSPCC visited to complete a workshop with year 2 and Oak class. Speak out Stay safe is a safeguarding programme for children. It helps children understand that they have the right to be safe; where to get help and the sources of help available to them, including the NSPCC Childline service. If you want to talk to your children at home about any of these subjects, the NSPCC website has some excellent resources including the fantastic 'PANTS' resource which is a great way of approaching the subject with younger children. Online Safety - Stay Safe Workshops Visit

We are so lucky that as part of our computing curriculum, every year we are visited by Stay Safe Workshops who work with all the children across the school to teach them how to stay safe online. Richard Pomfrett from Stay Safe talks with such insight and inspiration, it really helps the children to understand the importance of this subject. Following the sessions, Richard wanted to share with you some ways that you can support your child to stay safe online at home.





Social Media

The older children mentioned connecting with others and having accounts on WhatsApp (16+), TikTok (13+), SnapChat (13+), and some on Instagram (13+) and Discord (13+), many of whom didn't know if their settings were public or private. Richard encourages you to have open discussions with your children about using social media and emphasises the importance for young children of maintaining private social media accounts. Starting by checking if your child's social media is private or public is of course the first step if you are not sure.

Online Gaming

Gamers across all year groups talked about playing and chatting with people they don't know during online games. A list of the warning signs of grooming which were discussed with the children during the session, can be found below:

- Someone saying they share a hobby or interest with your child this could lead to them sharing personal details.
- Offering gifts children should never accept in-game currency or online gifts from someone they
 met online.
- Asking to make private connections e.g. through private platforms like WhatsApp or Snapchat.
- Asking for a meet up in real life.

Action Steps for Parents:

The most important thing you can do is take the time to fully understand what your children are doing online and the functions available on the apps and games they use – take a look and ask yourself:

Can they chat with others?

Can they connect with people they don't know?

What kind of content can they be exposed to?

What are the age ratings of the games and apps they use?

What setting are available to limit risk and encourage a more positive environment?

Sit down with your children and explore privacy settings in the games and apps your children use. Ask your children to show them how they BLOCK & REPORT people in the games and apps they use.

If you need to contact me directly, please do so at any time on head@whiteshill.gloucs.sch.uk however, if you need an immediate response or if it is something to do with your child on that day e.g. absence, pick-up arrangements, please always go through the school office on admin@whiteshill.gloucs.sch.uk as this is the only school email address that is checked every day by Mrs Angove. Thanks to Miss Middleton who organises all of our sporting events in school and Mrs Edmonds and Mrs Goodfield who almost always accompany the children off-site, alongside other staff members, we have been able to take part in a number of Atlas Sports events again across the term.

One of the real highlights was another very successful tag rugby competition, where the children were coached by the brilliant Tom Nurse, a former parent who runs our tag rugby club each week. The team came in a very impressive fourth place out of very large field of teams, following up from our silver medal last year to demonstrate the impact of Tom's work with the school since he started his sessions. The Oak class children will have chance to work with Gloucester Rugby again after Easter in their weekly PE sessions to follow up the progress we have making with this really inclusive and fun sport.

Maple class children took part in the gymnastics competition down at Stratford Park, stepping up with confidence to complete a floor and horse routine in front of a pair of judges – we were so proud of them!

Finally, we ended this month with such a wonderful moment as the Maple Class netball team returned to school with silver medals – making it all the way to a nail-biting final which they lost by only one goal! It was so wonderful to see their beaming faces on their return with their medals around their necks – such an achievement at an event where we are always one of the smallest schools.

This term, Maple Class took part in the Stemworks KNEX Challenge for the first time. This is a Gloucestershire wide competition run by a not for profit company who aim to generate excitement and interest in the STEM subjects of science, technology, engineering and maths. The children took part in a half day workshop where they were given a challenge which they had to solve by building with KNEX. They were invited to present their ideas to the judges who were looking at their ability to work together, solve problems, produce a working model, and communicate their ideas effectively. 




We are unique...

One of the absolute highlights of this term was of course Young Voices at the Birmingham NEC. It was our first time at this event as a school, one which I have attended as a parent myself and been desperate to take the children along to ever since! As soon as I left the arena on my first visit, my first thought was that our children at Whiteshill would absolutely relish such an experience and make the most of every second!

We took a huge group of children from year 3 to year 6 and they were just phenomenal, sitting sensibly, enjoying each other's company and lapping it all up! For those of you who have not been or don't know what this event involves, it is the world's largest children's choir. The children learn all the songs in the run-up and then they are joined by thousands of children from schools all over the country to perform together. Accompanying them is a full live band, backing singers and an internationally acclaimed Conductor, David Lawrence. The songs were fantastic this year, with a Moana mash-up, Matilda medley and a walking medley that included songs like 'These boots were made for walking' and 'Walking on sunshine' just some of the highlights! Mrs Edmonds and the children have been enjoying practising all these songs across the term (some of you will have seen a sneak preview of the Matilda Mdeley at the Festival of Light and Colour in December) and as a result they were absolutely raring to go and sang their hearts out! Doing all of the actions and dancing and swaying away throughout!

They loved waving to their parents in the audience and especially enjoyed the parents v children dance-off and the Mexican wave all the way around the stadium. Once the lights went out for the concert, it was truly breath-taking and experiencing it with our Whiteshill children is something I'm sure none of the staff members who attended will ever forget. The children were also treated to some incredible and inspiring performances, including MC Grammar, Urban Strides dance troupe and to top it all off, the ridiculously talented Nandi Bushell – a 13-year-old drummer who has performed at the Platinum Jubilee and on stage with the Foo Fighters. She was phenomenal and it was really inspiring for the children to see another child performing so confidently on stage. We hope that the children enjoyed the event as much as we did!! As part of our RSHE curriculum, we work closely with PCSO Amy Webb and her team. Many of you will know Amy from her role in the community. She is an excellent PCSO and is so keen to support the school and the village in many ways. She regularly visits us here and loves to work with the children to build their understanding of the police and their role in the community as well as help them build up trust with a familiar face in a police uniform.

This term, PCSO Webb and her team visited school to support the year 6 children through their SchoolsBeat programme which supports the children as they transition to secondary school, carried out their Sunnyhouse programme with Year 2 and 3 and then brought Colin the Crocodile in to Willow class to help them practise staying safe on the roads.
